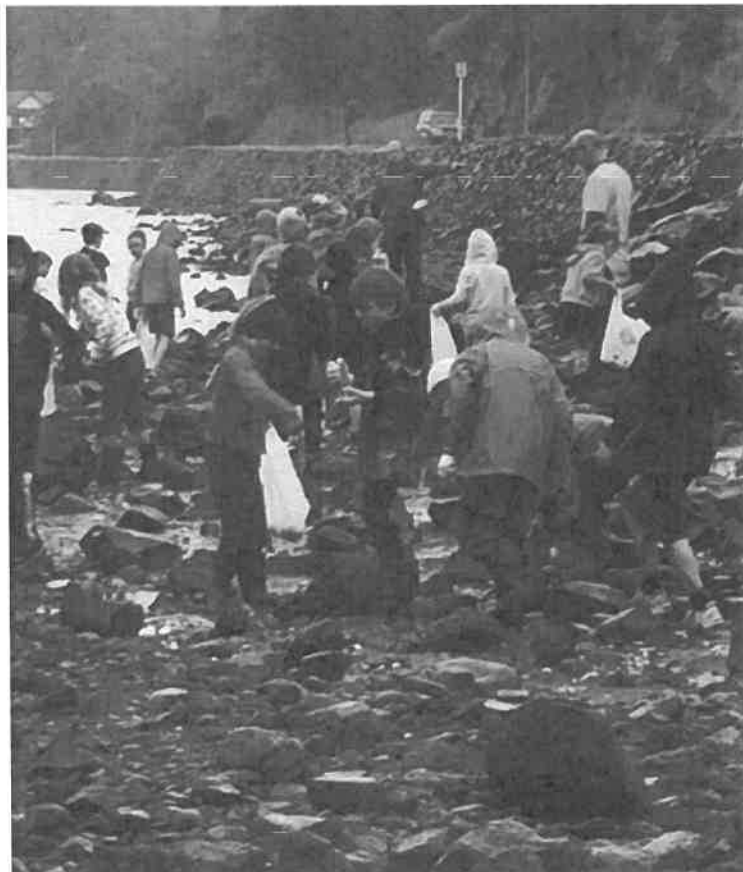
Dear Parents and Caregivers

## **BEACH CLEAN UP LAST WEEK**

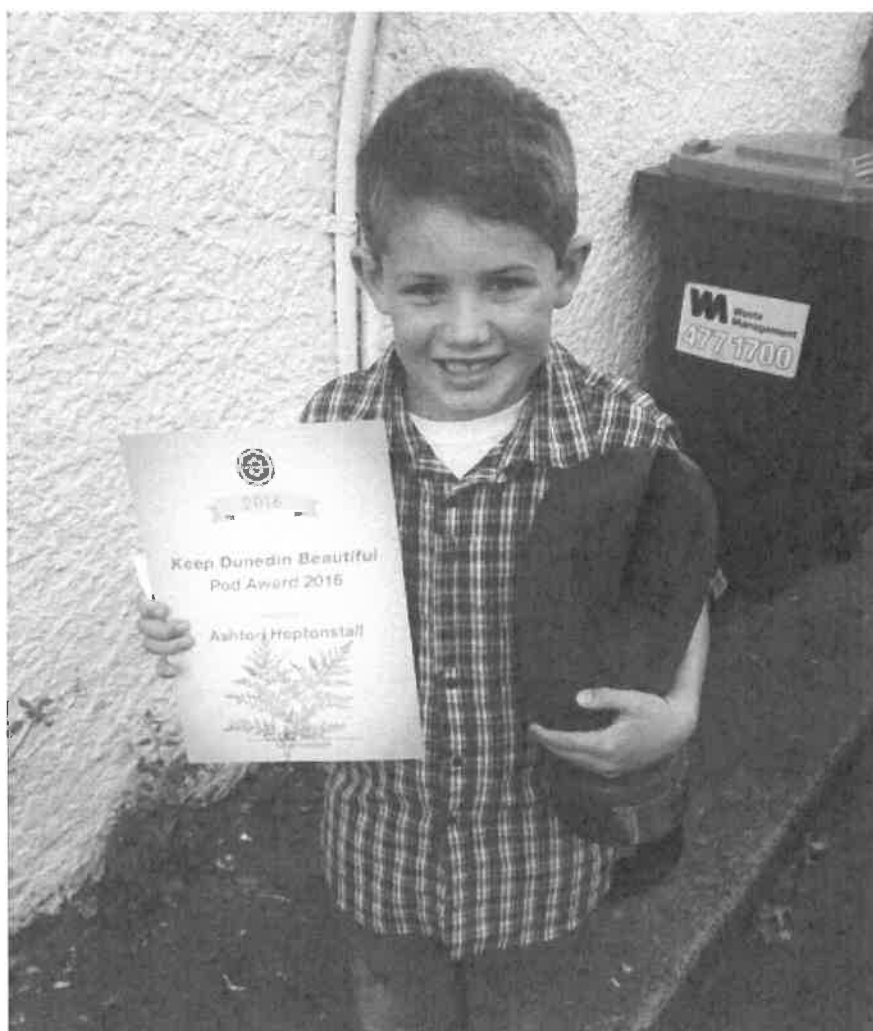
A bit of drizzle didn't deter us last week and we managed to do a great speedy beach clean up last Thursday morning.

Thank you to the parents who came along and helped out too. Tui and Kārearea class did a great job of sorting and analyzing the rubbish we collected and it was very interesting to see what was to be found – wire, glass, plastic and the list goes on!





We were inspired to do the beach clean up by one of our Year 2 pupils, Ashton Heptonstall, who regularly cleans up beaches with his parents in his spare time. Congratulations to Ashton for the recent recognition he received for his efforts, winning the Keep Dunedin Beautiful Pod Award for 2016.

*Interview with Ashton Heptonstall- Year 2 pupil at Macandrew Bay School*

*Ashton was interviewed by Year 4/5 children from Korimako Class at Macandrew Bay School.*

**Ashton it was great to read the article about you in the ODT, all about the work you are doing cleaning up rubbish off local beaches. We are keen to find out more.**

**Can you tell us why you started cleaning up beaches?**

**Ashton:** " I don't think it is good for the environment to have rubbish at the beaches. I started it when I was two years old with my mum and dad. I saw a dead seagull with a hook in its mouth and I didn't like it. When I was four I started doing it a lot more often"

**Why do you like doing it?**

**Ashton:** " It's fun because I get to go to the sea and I like the water and I like sea animals too. My favorite sea animals are actually turtles"

**What particular sea creatures are you trying to save with your clean ups?**

**Ashton:** "Hector dolphins and bottle nosed dolphins who might eat this rubbish and die"

**Have you ever seen any sea creatures affected by the rubbish?**

**Ashton:** "Lots! I have seen sixty seagulls and three sparrows and thirteen mice. The seagulls were eating the rubbish including plastic bags and the sparrows got stuck in a plastic bag hanging in a tree."

**How do you go about it? What equipment do you need?**

**Ashton:** "You need gumboots, dry plastic bags to put the rubbish in, really thick gloves and sometimes pincers to pull out the rubbish if it is in a dangerous or tight spot."

**How often do you clean up beaches and when did you start doing this?**

**Ashton:** "I do it quite often. Sometimes every single day."

**How much rubbish would you pick up on an average beach clean up?**

**Ashton:** "I would usually fill up two plastic supermarket bags full in about half an hour."

**What sort of rubbish do you usually find?**

**Can you list some of it?**

**Ashton:** "Plastic bags and packets,(sometimes they have teeth marks in them), bottles, coke bottles ,beer bottles ( once it was still full), bottle caps, paint lids."

**What is one of the most unusual bits of rubbish you have ever found?**

**Ashton:** "A small plastic superhero. Actually it was Superman!"

**How many beaches have you been to and cleaned up and which ones were they?**

**Ashton:** "Portobello, Pilots' Beach, Broad Bay, Company Bay and loads in the UK. Macandrew Bay is usually pretty clean."

**What do you do when the tide is in and you see rubbish floating in the water? Do you go into the water to get it?**

**Ashton:** "Yes, I do go in sometimes but I always do it with Mum or Dad nearby. I don't always go in."

**Were these beaches all on the Peninsula or have you also cleaned up beaches in town or further away?**

**Ashton:** "I go to Christchurch a lot so we do it up there too. That is why it is so tidy up there."

**Have you got a favorite beach that you really enjoy keeping clean?**

**Ashton:** "Pilots' Beach is my favorite. There is great wildlife there."

**If Pilots' Beach is your favorite beach how many times have you cleaned it up?**

**Ashton:** "Probably 60 times!"

**What was the worst beach for rubbish you have found as you have been doing this?**

**Ashton:** "Pilots' Beach. Once I saw a dead penguin there that had something plastic stuck on its beak. Actually it was a ring from a milk bottle top."

**What do you think is the cleanest beach from your experience?**

**Ashton:** "Macandrew Bay beach is pretty good."

**Are any types of beaches worse than others for rubbish eg popular beaches, sandy , rocky or muddy beaches or are they all about the same?**

**Ashton:** " Rocky beaches. The rocks can trap the rubbish under the rocks."

**Do you spot a lot of sea creatures or wildlife when you are out cleaning up beaches?**

**Ashton:** " Yes. At the Albatross Centre I see a lot of seals. I love seeing them but I don't go too close!"

**Have you got any tips or advice for other people who might want to follow your example and get out and clean up beaches?**

**Ashton:** " Spread the word and tell everybody to keep the beaches clean. I would like to put up signs about it.

Also when you go to a beach bring a bag and pick up rubbish and if there is lots go back and do it again. If you are eating or drinking something don't just drop your rubbish. Look around for a bin or take the rubbish home with you.

**Thank you Ashton. We are really impressed with what you are doing and hopefully this story will encourage the rest of us to do it too!**

### **KORIMAKO MARINE MONITORING PROJECT**

On Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> Korimako class had a very important and enjoyable job to do down at Macandrew Bay's rocky shore. They got busy monitoring all the marine plants and creatures that were to be found in a square metre.

Sally Carson and Shelley Dixon from the Portobello Marine Lab worked with the class to help them identify and count what they found. They then came back to class and entered their data on the Metre Squared website. This valuable work is part of a long term Citizen Science project monitoring the life and health of the Harbour. The Marine Scientists are particularly keen to investigate whether dredging the harbor is impacting on the marine life living in our Harbour.

This is a great Social action project that our Year 5 pupils have been able to undertake as part of this term's Inquiry topic.

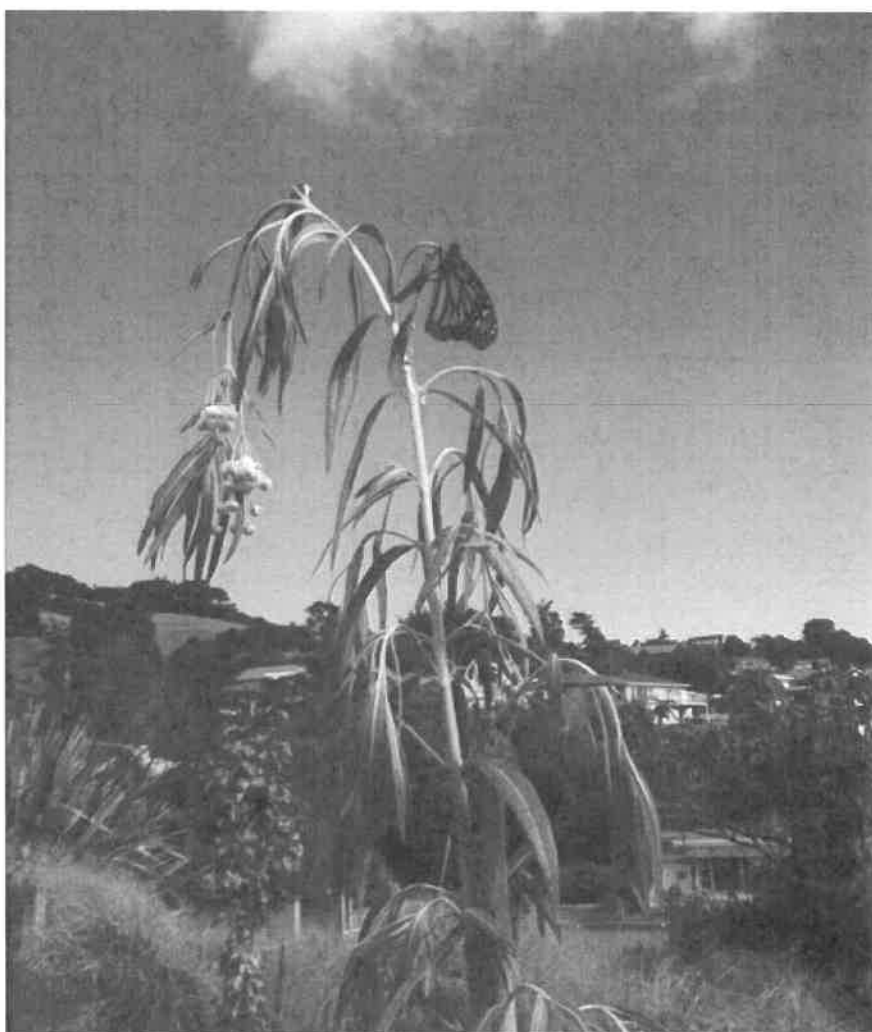
Children guessed this number of days:

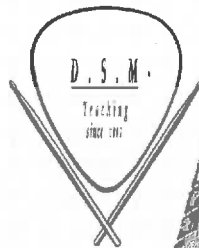

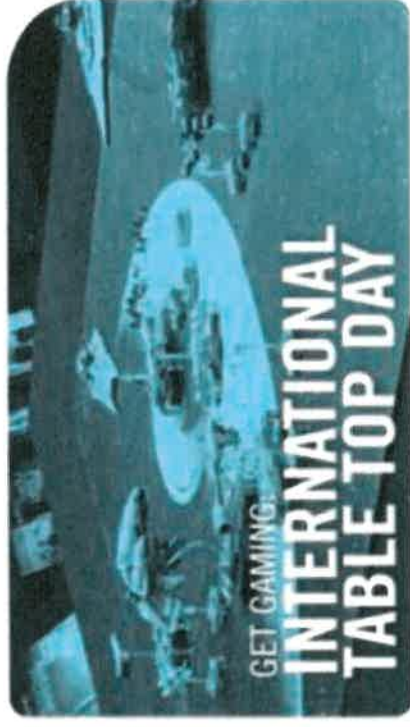
