Good afternoon all

We have now confirmed the road closure arrangements with the contractor. We are grateful that they have been flexible with these arrangements to allow greater access during the morning peak times.

Road closures will start on November 7 and be in place for approximately 10 days. Wherever possible, the road will be open to allow access.

During this time, the road will remain open between 7.00am and 9am to provide for people needing to get to school or work. (Please note we are not advertising this to the general public. The public notices state that the road closure is from 7am to 6pm to discourage people from travelling through the site.)

Between 9am and 6pm each day, the road will be closed to provide access for delivery and construction vehicles.

A traffic controller will be stationed at the Highcliff Road / Camp Road intersection to tell drivers when the road is closed and when it is expected to reopen.

The road will be open overnight under the same arrangements that are in place now.

No road closure will be in place on 14 November as this is a cruise ship day.

The road closure point will be located at the intersection of Highcliff Road and Camp Road. Access will be provided for any residents needing access to a property between the closure point and the construction site.

Can I please ask for your patience while this important work is carried out. The contractor will do everything they can to minimise disruption, but the most important thing is that the work site remains safe for contractors and members of the public.

Baking Recipes for Fair

Chocolate Fudge

300 g marshmallows
1 ½ cups sugar
⅔ cup evaporated milk
¼ cup butter
350 g chocolate chips.
1 teaspoon vanilla
½ teaspoon salt

In saucepan combine marshmallows, sugar, evaporated milk, butter and salt. Bring to the boil, stirring over moderate heat. Boil 5 minutes, stirring constantly over med heat. Remove from heat and add chocolate chips. Stir gently until smooth, add vanilla. Pour into lined dish 20 cm square. Leave to set in fridge.

Fruit and nut Chocolate

225 g roasted peanuts
2 tablespoons cocoa
1 ½ cups milk powder
2 cups cornflakes
1 cup sultanas
225 g kremelta
1 ½ cups icing sugar

Melt kremelta in pot, add all other ingredients, stir well. Pour into a swiss roll tin, and leave to set in fridge.

White candy

2½ cups rice bubbles
1 cup coconut
¾ cup icing sugar
1 cup milk powder
1 cup mixed dried fruit, cherries
250 g kremelta, melted

Combine all ingredients in a large mixing bowl. Press into a greased sponge roll tin. Leave overnight and cut into squares.

apricot fudge slice

This slice never fails to please. It is any easy, no-mess sweet that is an ideal treat to compliment a hot drink or to put in a lunch box.

INGREDIENTS:

125g butter
½ cup soft brown sugar
½ tin sweetened condensed milk
1 cup dried apricots, chopped
250g pkt wine biscuits, crushed
coconut, for sprinkling

Method

1. Heat the butter, brown sugar and condensed milk until the butter melts. Do not boil.
2. Add chopped apricots and crushed biscuits. Mix it well.
3. Press into a greased 20 x 30 cm sponge roll tin and sprinkle with coconut.
4. Set in refrigerator.
5. Ice with chocolate icing and cut into squares.

HOKEY POKEY

5 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons golden syrup

1 teaspoon Edmonds baking soda

Put sugar and golden syrup into a saucepan. Heat gently, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Increase the heat and bring to the boil. Boil for 2 minutes. Stir occasionally, if necessary, to prevent burning. Remove from heat. Add baking soda. Stir quickly until mixture froths up. Pour into a buttered tin immediately. Leave until cold and hard. Break into pieces.

COCONUT ICE

3 cups icing sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk
25 g butter

$\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt
 $\frac{3}{4}$ cup coconut
few drops red food colouring

Put icing sugar, milk, butter and salt into a saucepan. Heat gently, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Bring to the boil. Do not stir. Let mixture boil until the soft ball stage. Add coconut. Remove mixture from the heat and allow to cool for 10 minutes. Divide mixture in half. Add a few drops of food colouring to one portion and beat until mixture starts to thicken. Pour into a buttered tin. Beat the white portion until it starts to thicken. Spread this mixture on top of pink mixture. Allow to cool. Cut into squares.

RUSSIAN FUDGE

3 cups sugar
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sweetened condensed milk

125 g butter
 $\frac{1}{8}$ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon golden syrup

Put sugar and milk into a saucepan. Heat gently, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Add condensed milk, butter, salt and golden syrup. Stir until butter has melted. Bring to the boil and continue boiling to the soft ball stage, stirring occasionally to prevent burning. Remove from heat. Cool slightly. Beat until thick. Pour into a buttered tin. Mark into squares. Cut when cold. Vanilla essence or chopped nuts may be added to fudge before beating if desired.

MARSHMALLOWS

2 tablespoons gelatine
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water
2 cups sugar
1 cup water

1 teaspoon vanilla or peppermint
essence
coconut or icing sugar

Combine gelatine and first measure of water. Leave to swell for 10 minutes. Place sugar and second measure of water in a large saucepan. Heat gently, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Dissolve gelatine over hot water. Pour gelatine into sugar mixture and bring to the boil. Boil steadily for 15 minutes. Allow to cool until lukewarm. Beat well until very thick and white. Add vanilla or peppermint essence. Line a large tin with baking paper. Wet baking paper and pour mixture into the tin. Chill until set. Turn out of tin. Cut into squares and roll in coconut or icing sugar. Keep chilled.

TOFFEE APPLES

3 cups sugar
1 tablespoon DYC white vinegar
1 tablespoon butter
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon cream of tartar

few drops red food colouring
8 apples, approximately
8 wooden ice-block sticks or wooden
skewers

Put sugar, vinegar, butter and water into a saucepan. Heat gently, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Add cream of tartar and food colouring. Bring to the boil. Do not stir. Let mixture boil until the hard crack stage. While mixture is boiling, wipe the apples. Push an ice-block stick into each stem end. Remove pan from heat, tilt slightly then dip an apple into the toffee, turning to coat. Place on a sheet of baking paper or non-stick foil. Repeat with remaining apples. Leave until cold and set.

Shukuru Munro, from Broad Bay on the Otago Peninsula, is an artist, runner and entrepreneur. Originally from the *waringi* tribe near Kondoa in the northern part of Tanzania, Shukuru grew up as one of six siblings. From age 13, she was vocal about leaving the village and going far away, expressing the deep belief that there is an easier life for her elsewhere. She is the only member of her family to have ever left Africa.

Shukuru's native language is Swahili and her name means "thank-you". Her mother picked this name when her father passed away unexpectedly during the pregnancy, giving thanks to the blessing of having her.

Shukuru came to New Zealand at age 23, having met her husband Neil, a visiting New Zealand fisherman, in Dar es Salaam, where she moved at age 15 to live with an aunt. Neil and Shukuru have one teenage son.



Shukuru took up long distance running when her son was an infant, first as a means to get from A to B in a hurry pushing the stroller. She has been running marathons since 2008. Some of her natural physical ability stems from the active African lifestyle: carrying heavy loads and lots of dancing! She still prefers to carry heavy items on her head and dances at every opportunity.

With encouragement from her friend Old Jack, Shukuru started painting and selling her art in 2013. Her paintings depict traditional village life as she remembers it. She uses painting as means to keeping childhood memories alive and battle the occasional bout of homesickness.

Shukuru describes herself as always happy and everyone who's ever met her agrees. If you are ever driving the roads of the Otago Peninsula, make sure to wave to the smiling, colourfully dressed runner that's trailed by her friendly three legged dog, Bart.

That woman isn't a *teacher*.

- this is an example use of Ehara to negate an equative sentence

He tūnga matua te mahi a ngā *kaiako* ki te whakaako i ā tātou tamariki.

A *teacher's* job is important as they are the ones who teach our children.

- this is an example of a classifying sentence

Hoatu te āporo ki te *kaiako*.

Give the apple to the *teacher*.
