OTAGO PENINSUAL COMMUNITY BOARD UPDATE

Annual Plan 2016

The public consultation is underway for this year's Annual Plan, which the Dunedin City Council (DCC) uses to set its priorities for the year ahead and the budget to make things happen.

Last year, with the community's help, Dunedin City Council mapped out the next ten years for our city in the Long Term Plan (this happens every three years) and how this

would be paid for. They've tweaked the plan this year and want to know if you think they are still heading in the right direction. For example, Council is planning to put more money into economic development, arts and culture and community grants.

You can find out more about the proposed changes at www.dcc.govt.nz and then use the online form to let Council know what you think by **5pm on 20 April**. A consultation document outlining the key changes is going to every home in Dunedin, with information about how to give feedback. There will also be some events during the public consultation and it would be great to see you there to discuss the proposals.

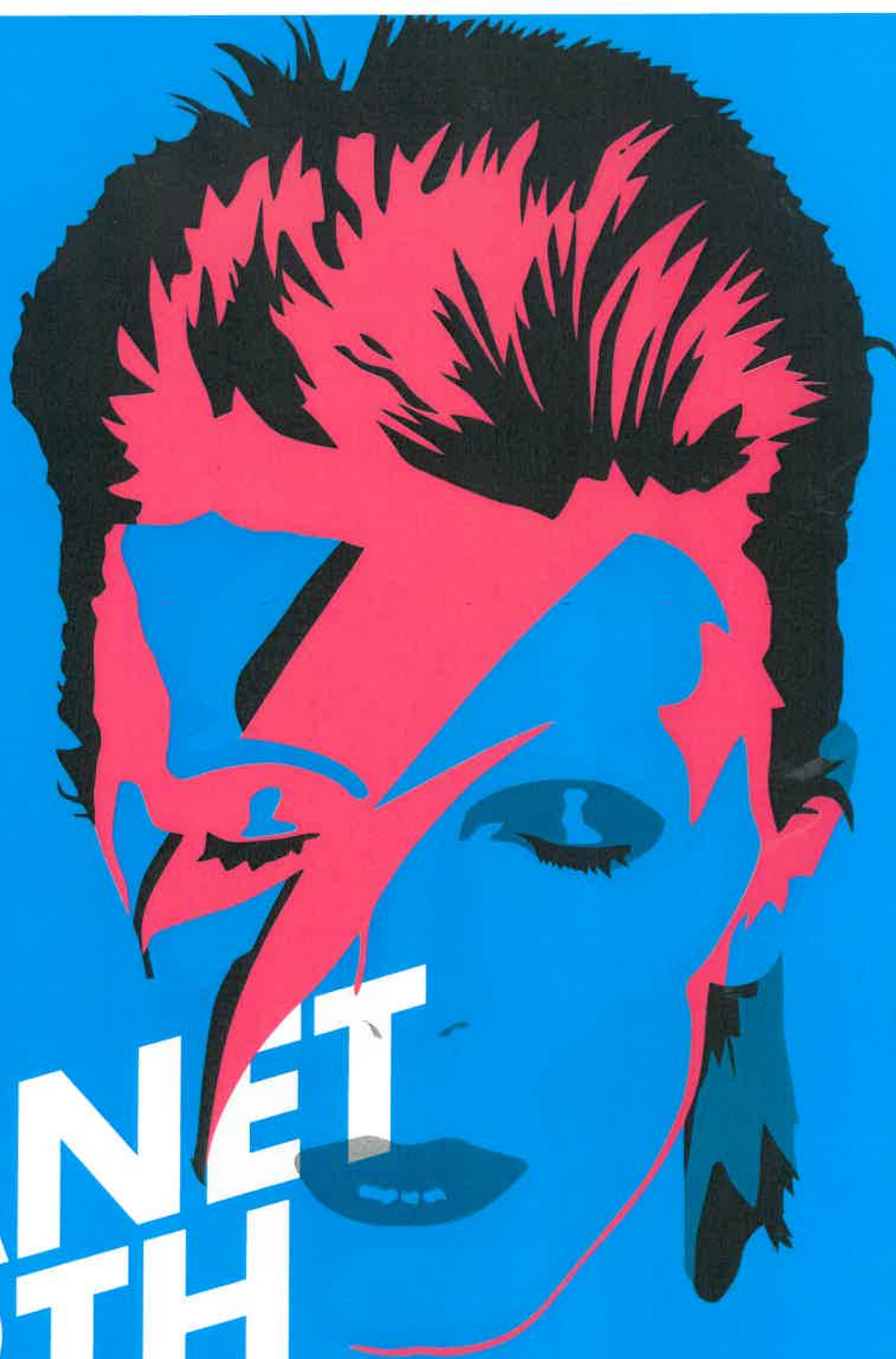

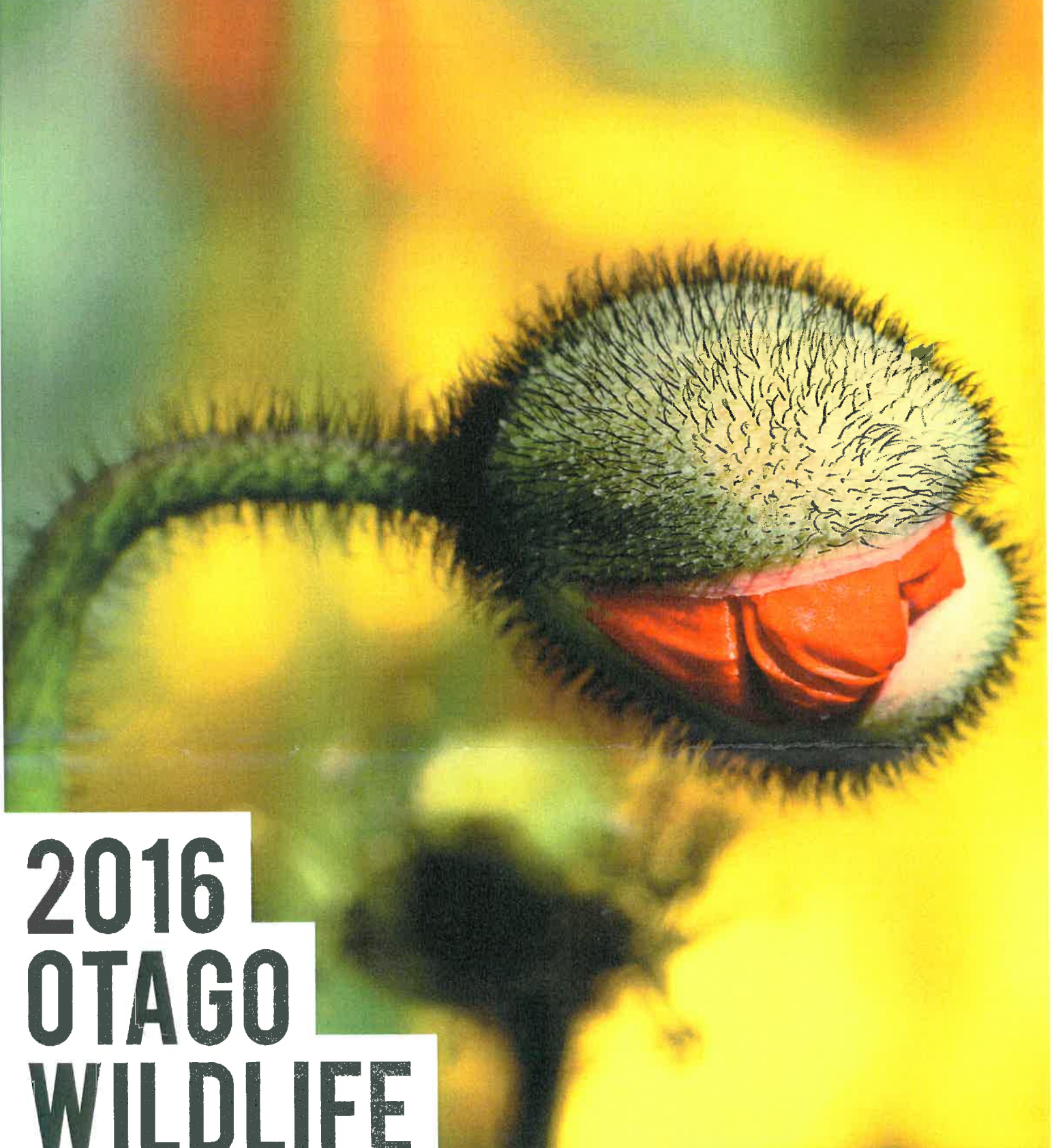

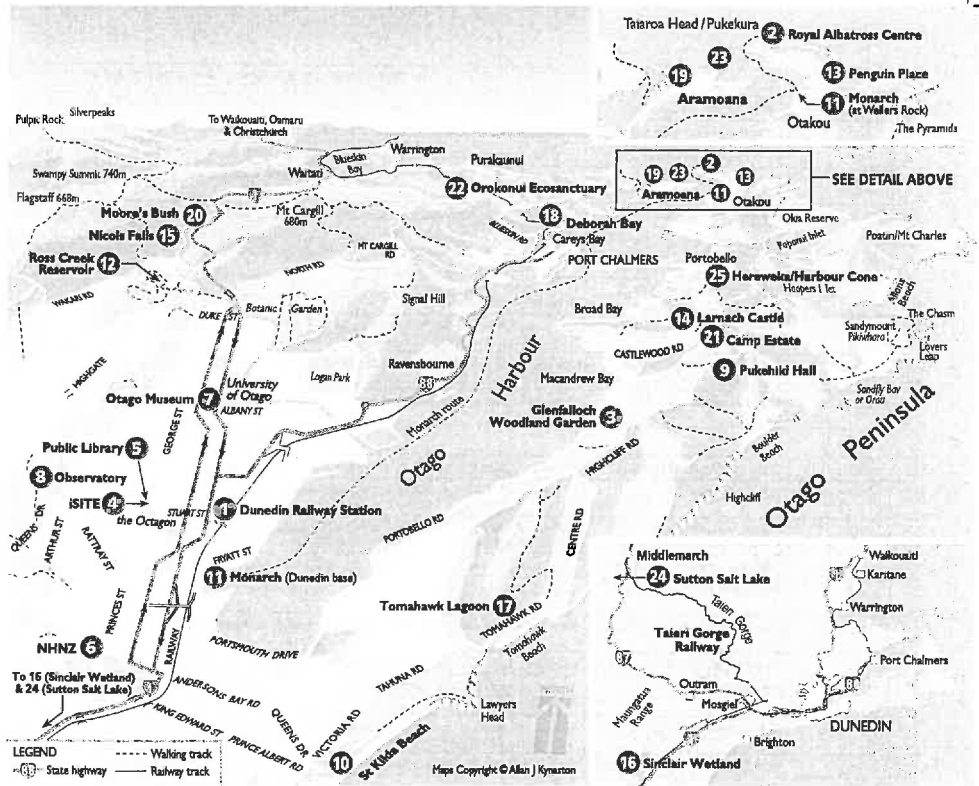
