## **LIBRARY – RANDOM ACTS OF READING (Notice from Gill, or Librarian)**

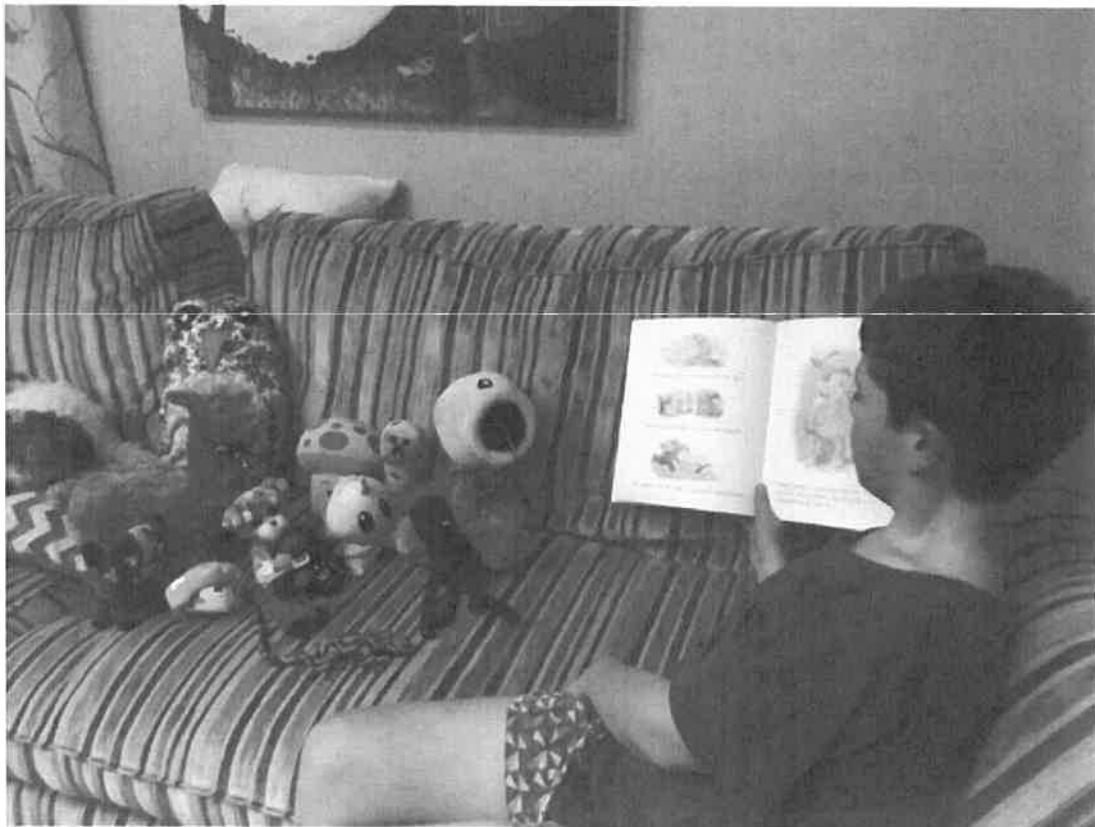

**Help** – Can you please check that Reading Books are being returned to school promptly? We are finding that some of our sets are missing copies so it means it does limit the books we can use with our groups.

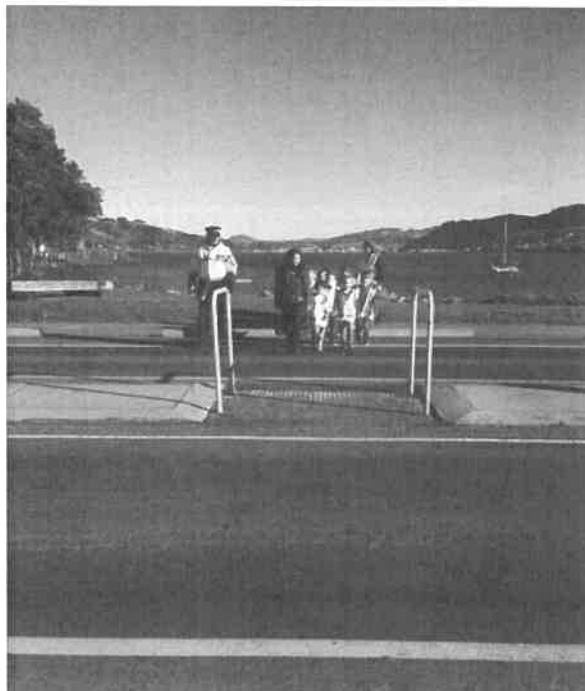

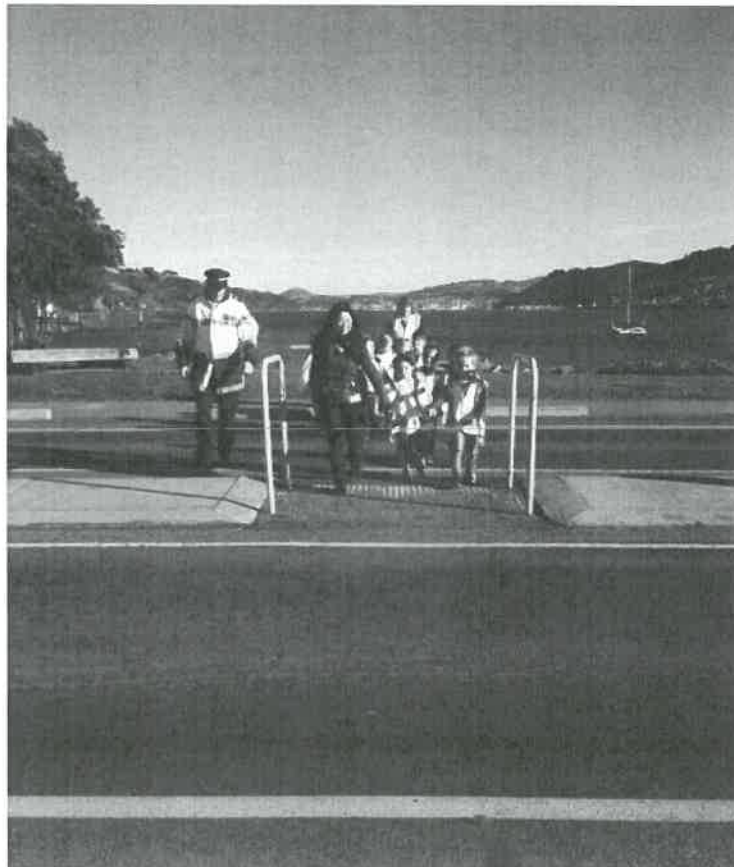
## **ROAD SAFETY PROGRAMMES WITH JOHN SOMERFIELD**

It has been great to have our Police Education Officer in the School over the past two weeks working with the classes on Road Safety.

He has also worked with the Senior classes on Cycle Safety.

The following photos are Kakano Class on their safety walk around and learning how to cross all roads including Portobello Road safely.





Next Tuesday he would like to do a session with the older children on the Tennis Court (weather depending) and would like children in Toroa, Korimako and Karearea to bring their bikes and cycle helmets to School so they children can learn more about Cycle Safety. They will do a bike obstacle course on the Tennis court.

Below us a summary of what we discussed.

### **Road Safety Issues in Macandrew Bay**

- Poor visibility because of bends in road for pedestrians and drivers
- School not on road but we still have dangerous roads to cross to get there
- Angle parked vehicles block visibility
- Volume and speed of traffic
- Measure distance from where traffic first appears to informal crossing – does this allow safe stopping?

- Also dangerous crossing from shop to Hall on Greenacres Street/Portobello Road Corner
- Cars backing out from Shop and playground area also the beach area
- Speed of motorists
- Walkway has increased volume but children still have to cross the busy Portobello Road
- School children hopping off buses
- Businesses would benefit from a safe crossing.
- More children could walk if safer, getting rid of congestion around the School

### **Ideas to Address Road Safety Issues**

- Build numbers in steering group
- Reviewing speed limit through Macandrew Bay
- Signage making people aware of children crossing
- A formal Pedestrian crossing (Big picture wish)
- Invite DCC Staff Member to come and meet and see what we are talking about
- School Zones – flashing lights
- More cars off road if walking was safer – less congestion

### **What to do Next**

- Talk to School Community and the wider Community (Newsletter)
- Talk to BOT
- Talk to Peninsula Community Board
- Talk to DCC – Write a Submission
- Build numbers in Steering group
- Write a letter – based on research
- Get signatures of support from Community
- Involve DCC Councillors, DCC Staff and members of the local Community Board
- Invite DCC Staff and Council members to come and hear our concerns
- Involve Children – gathering data
- Get a copy of Assessments of Safety Issues in Dunedin Schools and see if the assessment of Macandrew Bay's Safety issues reflect the current reality.

To celebrate Matariki and our beautiful new space Tutahi (a place where we stand

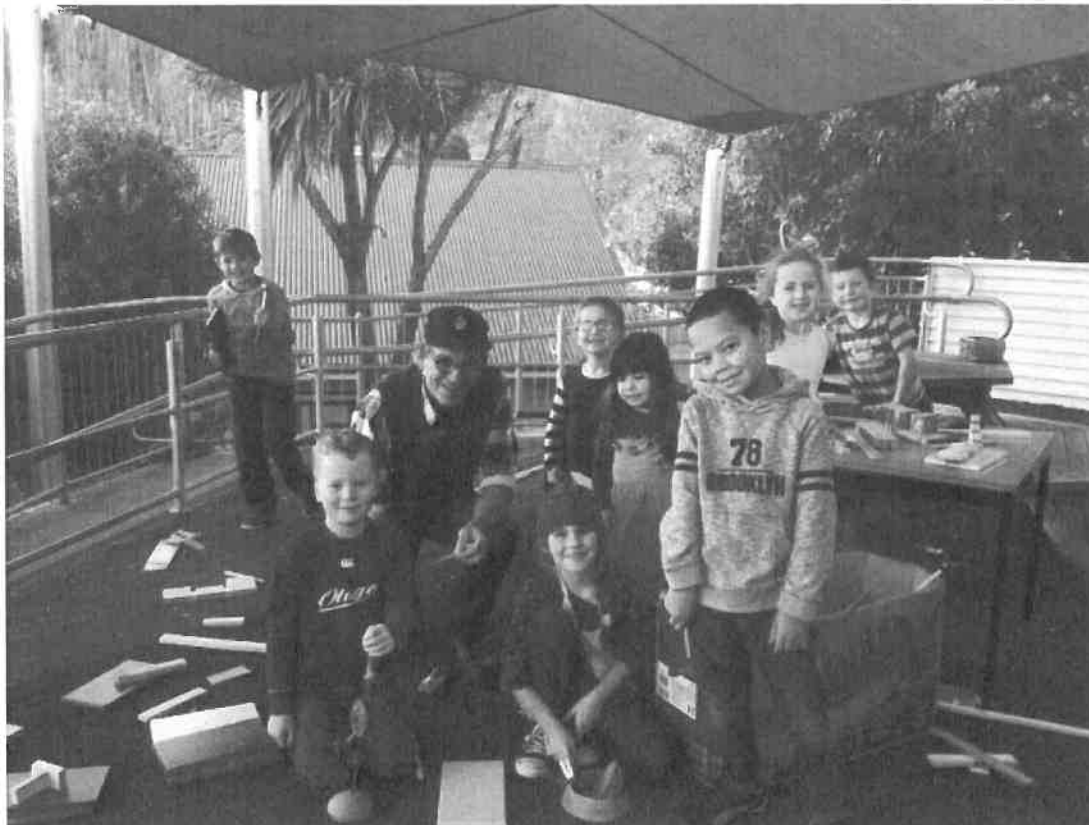
together) we are going to run Assembly a little differently this time.

### **LATE STARTS OR SCHOOL CANCELLATION DUE TO WEATHER CONDITIONS**

As June is now here I thought it might be wise to remind parents of the processes that are in place for our School and other Dunedin Schools in case of adverse weather conditions such as snow and ice.

In the event of very dangerous road conditions due to snow or black ice etc a blanket decision is made for the whole of Dunedin by Principals who live in the hill suburbs, after consulting Police etc. This includes Macandrew Bay School.

A decision is made on either a late start at 10.00am or to close Dunedin Schools for the day. It is very important that families listen to the radio if weather conditions are bad in town and particularly listen to the cancellation notices on local radio stations.

It is usually on after the 7.30am news and again at 8.00am. The reason these decisions are made are that even if children can get to school the staff often live some distance from the school and up on the hills and we can't guarantee that we can staff the school even if the children can make it.

It is great if you hear school is off that you let your friends and neighbours know too if their children also attend our school.

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# Strep throat - causes, symptoms, treatment

Strep throat, also called streptococcal sore throat, is an infection of the throat and tonsils caused by a Streptococcal bacteria. Typical symptoms are sore throat, chills, fever, and swollen lymph nodes in the neck. Strep throat is cured by antibiotic treatment. If left untreated, strep throat can cause serious heart and kidney complications.

Sore throats can be associated with colds and flu, tonsillitis and strep throat. This page deals primarily with strep throat. Refer also to our tonsillitis and influenza (flu) pages.



## Causes

The majority of sore throats are caused by viruses, most commonly a cold or flu virus. A viral sore throat will usually get better by itself, and has a low likelihood of complications.

A sore throat caused by bacteria, however, has a higher chance of complication and requires more attention. A sore throat in children that is accompanied by headache, high fever, stomach-ache, vomiting and/or severe tiredness, with or without a red rash, indicates the need for a visit to a family GP.

Although many types of bacteria can cause throat infections, Streptococcus, or strep, is the most common cause of bacterial sore throat.

Strep throat is contagious. It is spread by close contact with an infected person, usually by inhaling airborne droplets from an infected person.

Close-quarter living conditions, such as a family home, and school and university hostels, provide an ideal environment for the transmission of strep throat from one person to another. There is an approximate 40% risk of getting strep throat from an infected family member.

Children between the ages of 5 and 15 years have the highest incidence of strep throat.

A strep throat infection may involve inflammation of the tonsils (bacterial tonsillitis). However, treatment of the condition is likely to be different to that for viral tonsillitis.

## Signs and symptoms

Symptoms of strep throat develop one to four days after exposure to the bacteria via airborne droplets or by direct contact with an infected person.

The most characteristic symptoms of strep throat are sore throat and painful swallowing. Other symptoms include:

- Chills and fever
- Swollen and tender glands (lymph nodes) on the sides of the neck
- Red and swollen appearance inside the throat
- Pus-like white or yellow patches or spots may be visible on the back of the throat and on the tonsils
- Headache, nausea and vomiting may also be present.

Some people will develop a red skin rash that feels rough to the touch. A strep throat infection accompanied by this distinctive rash is known as scarlet fever. The rash is caused by toxins produced by the streptococcus pyogenes bacterium.

## Treatment

Because of the potential for serious complications, strep throat should be treated with antibiotics as soon as possible.



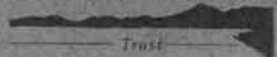
