BOOK FAIR WEEK 29 AUGUST – 2 SEPTEMBER

The Home and School are again running a Book Fair at school during the week of 29 August to 2 September.

Kind parent volunteers man the Book Fair and sell books from 8.30-9.30am each morning during the week and in the afternoons from 3.00-3.30pm. We would also love some volunteers to set up on Monday afternoon 29th 1.30pm – 3.00pm and pack up from 3.30-4.30pm on Friday 2 September. The Book Fair will begin after school on Monday.

Books will be available with a wide appeal for all ages of children. Once again we will not be sending wish lists home but we will take each class through the Book Fair to have a look at the books and parents will have the opportunity to look through the Book Fair both with and without children, before and after school. If you can't get along during the week and would like your child to bring home a wish list send a note along to the Office and we will give your child a wish list sheet. This is such a great way to get lovely new books for our Library as a percentage of the sales earns the school free Library books.

As a culmination to our Book Fair week we are inviting all the children and teachers to get dressed up as a character from a book or movie they like and to come to school for the day on **Thursday 1st September** dressed as their Book Character. We will have a sharing time at approximately 9.10am in the Library where everyone can see all the dress ups. Parents are very welcome to stay on so they can meet all the characters too. Usually we get each child to introduce themselves and whom they are dressed up as!

PAID UNION MEETINGS FOR TEACHERS 6th SEPTEMBER PM.

Issue: Introduction of Global Funding

The Primary and Secondary School Unions are holding combined meetings around the country in school time, which is very unusual. The Dunedin meeting will be held on the afternoon of Tuesday the 6th of September.

We are managing to send most of our teachers to the Paid Union Meeting while also keeping the school open for instruction for the usual hours because we have a number of student teachers in the school on control and Chris Ward and I are going to teach the Year 1 – 3 children collaboratively in the Library for the afternoon. Therefore there will be no disruption for any of our families.

It is very important that we do attend these meetings as there is a lot of concern about how this major review of School funding could impact on children.

Maximum class numbers will disappear so schools that are short of money and resources could have fewer teachers and much larger class sizes, impacting on children's learning. School's operational grants are severely stretched so sadly this could be a temptation in many schools.

Currently our teaching staff are paid directly from the staffing entitlement that each school generates based on it's roll and set formulas for staffing and class sizes. The operational grant is a separate pot of money. Under global funding this money will all be combined together so trade offs could be made between employing teachers and teacher aides and other costs schools face.

Teachers are keen to get informed and to see if this funding review can be an opportunity to get better funding for education rather than ending up potentially going in the wrong direction. Quality teaching and children's learning is potentially at risk if we get this wrong.

POLYFEST PREPARATION

We have combined rehearsals planned to take place here at school in Tutahi with our Te Mua Upoko friends joining us from Broad Bay and Portobello Schools for the next three Tuesday mornings.

This will be very important in getting us prepared for Polyfest. I am having difficulty emailing videos of the waiata but if you call into school I could put them on a memory stick. All children in Te Mua Upoko have been sent home with the words of the haka and waiata to learn. I attended the Polyfest Briefing last night so can confirm Te Mua Upoko are due to perform at approximately 12.30pm on Thursday 15th September. This time is approximate only so you need to allow time to be there earlier and to stay longer.

HEAD LICE

We are having more parents calling to let us know that head lice are appearing in their children's hair.

Could you all please check you child and treat for head lice if necessary. If your child does have head lice please remember that they should stay away form class until they have been treated.

STAFF CARPARK

We would ask parents to be considerate in the way they use the School Carpark. The Disability Park is only for the Mobility Taxi or those with a Disability sticker to use as we need to get our wee boy in a wheelchair catered for safely. The parks are for the staff primarily as they need parking for the day. The drop off circuit is only for dropping off and not a place to park up and wait or walk away from while take your children into class or come in to pick them up. Schools are notorious places for encountering chaos at the school gate but with consideration and courtesy for others and a willingness to walk a short distance I am sure we can manage this well and minimize any problems

SLIDE

We have shifted the stainless steel slide from the main playground and installed a different

slide behind the Junior block with a much lower platform. This is because we always struggled to keep woodchips and a soft landfall under the elevated old platform set up on a mound.

We will remove the old platform in the very near future and have a think long term about what could go in this space once we flatten the area at some stage next year.

The big yellow slide still remains in the main playground for the children to have fun using.

Macandrew Bay School Board of Trustees Health and Safety

HEALTH AND SAFETY IS EVERYONE'S RESPONSIBILITY

This policy should be read in conjunction with the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015.

Purpose

The Macandrew Bay School Board of Trustees is committed to ensuring the health and safety of all workers, students, visitors and contractors by complying with relevant health and safety legislation, regulations, New Zealand standards, and approved codes of practice.

The board of trustees is committed to providing and maintaining a safe and healthy culture and workplace for all workers, students, and other people in the workplace, with a focus on continual improvement.

We will achieve this through:

- making health and safety a key part of our role, thinking and practice
- working with our workers to improve the health and safety system at our school
- doing everything reasonably possible to remove or reduce the risk of injury or illness
- making sure all incidents, injuries and near misses are recorded in the appropriate place
- investigating incidents, near misses and reducing the likelihood of them happening again
- having emergency plans and procedures in place
- training everyone about hazards and risks so everyone can work safely
- providing appropriate induction, training and supervision for all new and existing workers, including relievers
- helping workers who were injured or ill return to work safely
- making sure contractors and sub-contractors working at the school operate in a safe manner.

Workers in the Workplace (employees, temporary workers, contractors & volunteers)

All workers are encouraged to play a vital and responsible role in maintaining a safe and healthy workplace through:

- being involved in improving health and safety systems at work - by being well informed about good health and safety practices
- following all instructions, rules, procedures and safe ways of working
- reporting any pain or discomfort as soon as possible
- reporting all injuries, incidents and near misses
- helping new workers, staff members, trainees and visitors to the workplace understand the safety procedures and why they exist
- Workers elect a Health and Safety Representative to support workers participation and engagement
- reporting any health and safety concerns or issues through the reporting system
- keeping the work place tidy to minimise the risk of any trips and falls
- wearing protective clothing and equipment as and when required to minimise your exposure to workplace hazards.

Others in the workplace

All others in the workplace including students, parents and visitors are encouraged to:

- follow all instructions, rules and procedures while in the school grounds
- report all injuries, incidents and near misses to their teacher or other staff members
- wear protective clothing and equipment as and when required to minimise their exposure to hazards when required
- Students are provided with basic health and safety rules, information and training and are encouraged to engage in positive health and safety practices.

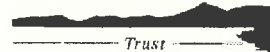

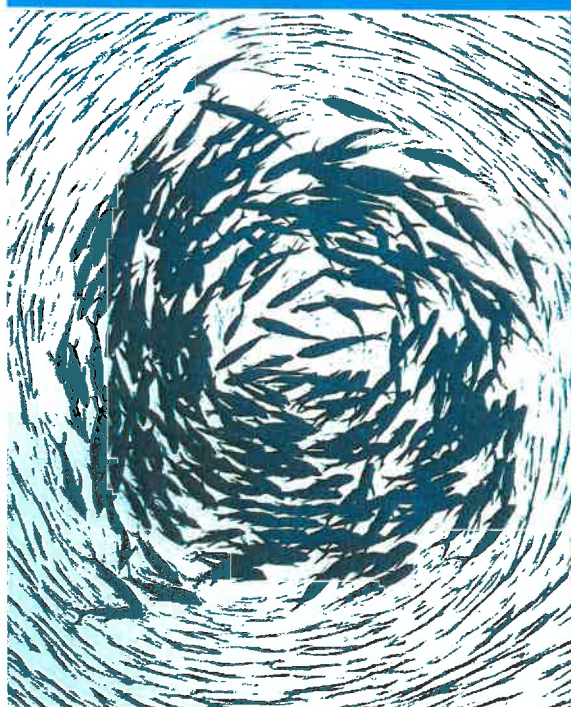

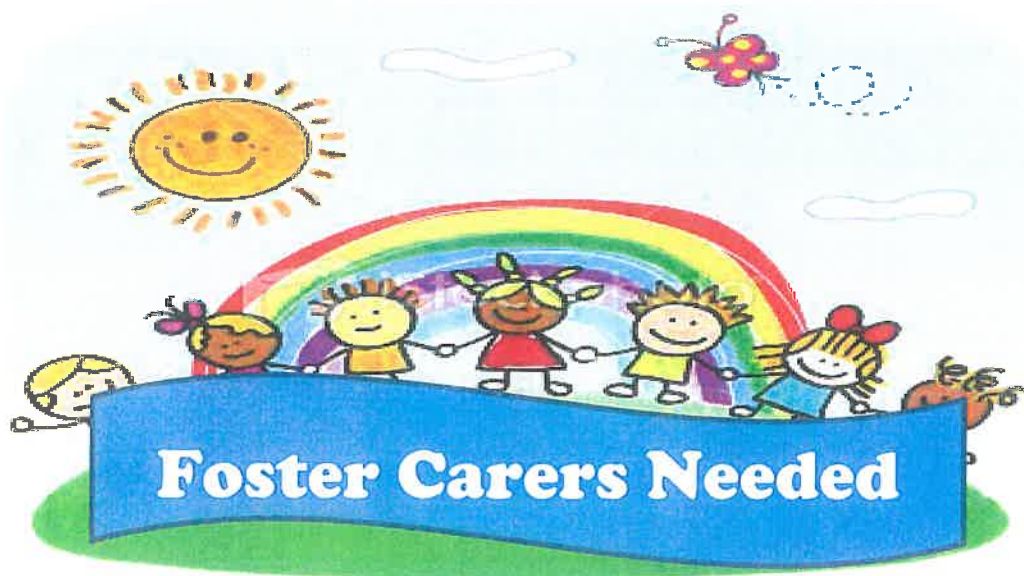
