What lives in our backyard?

This term we have a Science/ Enviro Schools focus for our inquiry.

At Macandrew Bay School we treasure and value our school environment. This term we are continuing our manaakitanga work by diving deeper into what lives in our backyard and what we can do to protect and maintain it.

Tahu from Orokonui Sanctuary visited our school on Monday and this was a fabulous igniter for our topic. All classes with the support of Tahu have picked an area of the school they would like to develop, nurture and protect.

Our focus for this science topic will be the living world where the children will learn:

- Living things have different features/ characteristics in order to survive.
- We can describe living things by their different characteristics.
- We can classify things as living or non-living/animal or not, based on these characteristics.

We will use the Enviro Schools Guiding Principals to underpin this inquiry

Learning for sustainability-is a holistic, action and future-focused approach to learning, that engages our whole selves and addresses all aspects of our local and global environment.

Sustainable communities act in ways that nurture all aspects of nature, including people, now and in the future. By working together and supporting each other we create safe, healthy, equitable and thriving communities.

Some of the class projects include our school garden, planter boxes that were created as part of whakarangatira, our stream, bird feeders and much more!


The children were fascinated with how he had 2 carrots, 2 apples and 2 flapjacks to ration over the three days while he was completing his solo journey.






Tennis Courts

Attendance in Term 4- Every day counts!

At Macandrew Bay School we want to make every day count!

Attending school every day is essential for learning. It means your child can:

Make progress in reading, writing, maths, and other skills

Feel confident in the classroom

Make friends and build social skills

Build good habits for life

When children are regularly absent from school they miss out on important learning. They may get behind in their schoolwork, find it difficult to maintain friendships, and could become unsettled and anxious about coming to school.

How parents can support good attendance: Have a good routine in the morning and evening so your child is organised and prepared for school Switch off devices in the evening and remove from bedrooms to encourage a good night's sleep Arrange medical and other appointments after school where possible Keep family holidays and trips away in school holiday times Talk with your child regularly about their learning and celebrate their progress Talk to your child's teacher if you're having difficulty getting your child to school or have any concerns or worries.

Slapped cheek- Fifth Disease

We have had a case of Slapped cheek in our kura.

Slapped cheek (also known as fifth disease) is a common childhood illness. It causes bright red cheeks – like you've been

slapped – and a lace-like rash on the body.

How is slapped cheek spread?

Slapped cheek is caused by the human parvovirus B19 (no connection to the animal parvovirus).

Slapped cheek is passed on in droplets from the respiratory tract of an infected person, mainly by close contact, coughing and sneezing. Once infected the time until symptoms appear is between 4 and 20 days.

If you catch slapped cheek, you'll be infectious for 5 or 6 days before the first symptom appears. You'll stop being infectious once the rash appears.

Slapped cheek rapidly spreads through schools and childcare facilities and is most common during winter and spring.

Slapped cheek is a mild disease and most children will have only mild symptoms.

Early symptoms may include:

- low-grade fever
- chills
- headache
- body ache
- sore throat
- diarrhoea.

After 3–7 days these symptoms improve and a rash develops. This starts with firm, bright red cheeks that are burning hot ('slapped cheek'). A fine, red, lace-like rash then develops on the child's body, arms and legs. The rash may be itchy and may seem to fade and then flare up when the child is hot or upset. The rash usually lasts for 2 weeks but may last up to 6 weeks.

Time off from kura or school

Affected children may remain at school, because you stop being infectious once the rash appears.


