Week 7 has zoomed by and we do hope that yesterday was not too disruptive for you and your whānau. This is the third strike I have been apart of during my 26 year career. Strike action is not something that teachers and principals take lightly- in fact it is a last resort. Teachers and principals have consistently raised high workloads, lack of support for students with additional learning and behavioural needs, and undervaluing of the profession as key issues over the last few years. Yesterday we had the opportunity to unite with Early Childhood, Secondary and Primary Principal's to share our message. That message is our tamariki need a quality education and we want to give that to them. We cannot do this under the latest collective agreement offer. **Our tamariki deserve better!**

We have had a focus on Science in the school this week investigating physical and chemical change and the children have been working on their observation skills. We gather data by using our senses: sight, hearing, touch, taste, smell - to make observations. Making careful observations often includes measuring something. Observations are influenced by what you already know.

Happy St Patrick's Day to everyone and especially to our Irish whānau.

Enjoy Otago Anniversary day on Monday with your whānau. I hope you get to do something nice. We look forward to seeing the tamariki on Tuesday!

After that we rode out onto the road to practise signalling, riding around parked cars safely and giving way to traffic at the intersection of Conway and Greenacres Streets. It was really helpful to know the road rules that we went over in class on a powerpoint.

In the afternoon the sun was shining and we headed out onto the Cycle Path for a long ride along the harbour towards Portobello. The children absolutely loved this day and we learnt a lot about being safe on our bikes. Leah announced that it was the best day of school EVER!

On Friday last week I took the Year 5 and 6 girls to Logan Park with hundreds of other girls from across Dunedin for a day of sport! We had fun learning Cricket skills, Rugby Skills (with the help of Sarn's big sister) and Football skills. We rotated around stations at each sport. It was wonderful to see the girls getting stuck in, having fun and displaying their amazing skills! Thanks so much to the parents that helped with transport and to Raul and Andrea for staying to help for the day.

It was NZ Science Week so Whakarangatira was a great opportunity to get a range of science activities happening in our school.


On Wednesday our Senior School had an exciting afternoon with a range of exciting and engaging workshops.

Parent/Whānau Interviews

Thank you to our whānau members for coming out and supporting our recent interviews.

We hope that the opportunity to connect with your child's class teacher was valuable. As a kura we find these interviews so useful as we often gain really valuable insights into the tamariki from information you share. It is also a great opportunity to align our goals with your goals for the tamariki. We are currently reviewing our assessment and reporting to whānau and our next interviews are student led conferences which will happen mid year. We find student led conferences are a really empowering process for our tamariki and most enjoy sharing their learning.

What are Student-led conferences?

- The student takes the central role during discussions.
- The teacher acts as the facilitator and prompter where necessary.

The teacher is involved but is not necessarily sitting with the student and parents all of the time. There might be three or four groupings of parents and students discussing their work in a classroom. At our school the students prepare a presentation to share with whānau and often tamariki share their favourite learning, activities and games from their classroom.



COVID and illness

There seems to be a bit of COVID around in our school community at the moment with a few cases in some of our classes.

Just a reminder about keeping your tamariki home if they are unwell. We have plenty of RAT tests available in the office if your whānau would like these. We are happy to send these home with your child if you email the office. Please let us know if your child does test positive with Covid-19 so we can monitor the potential spread in classes and support you.

In summary: If you test positive for COVID- You must self-isolate for 7 days while you recover.

Day 0 is the day your symptoms started or when you tested positive, whichever came first.



Voluntary School donations and Sports Fees

VOLUNTARY SCHOOL DONATIONS - Your support makes a big difference to our school budget!

Although this is voluntary it does make a big difference to our school operations and finances if people do opt to pay it and it means that the children get a better deal in the classroom and the school has some hope of breaking even financially each year.

We try very hard to keep costs to a minimum for families. Our

suggested School Donations this year are the same amount as last year - \$25.00 per term or \$100.00 per child for the whole year. You are more than welcome to pay these per term or for the whole year – whichever suits you. Some parents have set up regular small direct debit contributions and that is fine also. It is worth parents knowing that the receipt you receive for any donations made to school can be used for an income tax credit from Inland Revenue.

You need to state clearly your child's name and what the money is for in the reference information e.g school donation, activity donation, sports fees, stationary etc.

You can also pay with cash or eftpos at the school office.

VOLUNTARY ACTIVITY DONATION

The suggested Activity Donation again is \$10.00 per child per term, or you may wish to pay \$40.00 for the whole year in one go. This money is used to help cover the costs of buses and activities such as going to the Museum, Sports Events, Toitu, Art Gallery, and it also pays for visits to school by different musical and drama performing groups etc, though Art Auction funds also help with these activities too. Payment can be made with eftpos at the school office or by internet banking to the school account.

SPORTS FEES

We offer many sporting opportunities for children outside of school hours. Participation in these teams is reliant on payment of the fee by a set date. This is a fee, not a donation, as it is not part of the required school curriculum, so must be paid in order for your child to participate.

Coal Boiler upgrade

Last year our school was selected to be part of the Replacement School coal boilers to reduce greenhouse gas emissions programme because we have a very old coal boiler that heats our school. The project is being delivered by Ministry of Education consultants with support from the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority.

Coal boilers are replaced with renewable wood or electric heating sources, such as heat pumps. The demolition work on the old coal boiler at school is being completed at the moment following very strict ministry guidelines. The replacement for our coal boiler is going to be a pellet boiler which will be housed in a container adjacent to the old boiler room. The photos below show some examples of what these look like. We are excited about having some green planting on the side of the container! We hope to have this all up and running for Term 2.
