Keen Kererū is off to a great start!

What a great 6 weeks Kererū have had getting to know each other and our new space. It just keeps getting better every day as we make it our own and get our amazing work up on display.

We were really excited this week to have our first Whakarangatira session for 2023. We all enthusiastically opted into science themed workshops. In Kererū, we explored creating a chemical change. We started by observing what happens when we add white vinegar to baking soda in a bottle with a cork on top. We wondered why this had happened so we explored this idea a little more and observed what changes can be made when materials are mixed. We took what we learned from our experiments and tried the rocket experiment again and even managed to blow up a balloon. This made us very curious about what other chemical reactions we could

make by mixing materials. We had lots of keen volunteers keen to explore this a little further.

We have absolutely loved our time in the pool this term and it has been a great way to cool down on those hot afternoons. We have continued to practice our freestyle technique throughout our sessions and managed to have some fun along the way! Fridays were a great time to do aqua aerobics and try out some new dance moves.



Board of Trustees News

Kia ora koutou katoa and hoping that Term One is off to a great start for all our MacBay families.

On behalf of your Macandrew Bay School/Te Kura o te Rotopāteke Board of Trustees (BOT), I'm here to extend a cheery hello and to share an update on what we are working on this year. We are a group of eight - five elected parent representatives (Julia Albrecht, Sarah Ali-Khan, James Angelson, William McKee, Kerry McMillan), as well as Jess

McAuley (Staff Representative), Khyla McBride (Secretary) and our wonderful Tumuaki/Principal, Nic Brown.

For those who don't know what the BOT does (and I certainly didn't at this time last year!), we have a number of tasks: developing school policies (for example, our Sun Safety Policy), promoting the school, managing budgets, monitoring student achievement, reviewing our curriculum, and supporting our staff and Tumuaki. In a nutshell, we are here to ensure our school runs smoothly, fairly and transparently, reflects the values and needs of our whānau, and remains exceptional!

We generally meet every month or so, on a Monday night (our next meeting is scheduled for March 27th). These meetings are open to our school community, so you are welcome to come along and observe proceedings.

Last November we asked you, our whānau, to fill out a survey on your ideas for your children's learning and the school. We also gathered the views of our tamariki and staff. This information has informed our Long-Term Strategic and Annual Planning to be rolled out by our wonderful staff, and our School Charter. The Charter lays out the school vision, values and goals, and provides a detailed roadmap of learning activities for 2023 and the next three years. This is well-worth a read if you'd like an in-depth understanding of how school life is shaped at Te Kura o te Rotopāteke/Macandrew Bay School. The Charter will be linked on our soon-to-be live new school website, or please get in touch with Khyla if you would like a copy.

This year amongst other jobs, the BOT will have a particular focus on ensuring our school goals are well-aligned with the new Ministry of Education National Education Learning Priorities (or NELPs). We will be looking for further opportunities to embody the principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi through Tikaka/Tikanga Māori and Te Reo at our school, and to ensure that we celebrate and value all the cultures and languages that our tamariki bring to the school community. Likewise, we will continue with our strong enviro focus. We have recently allocated funding for additional literacy support for those students who need it. Also, James and William will be working with Nic to plan improvements and development of the school property, including updating the administration block and staff room. We will continue to report on what the BOT are up to as the year goes on. In the meantime, please do come up and say hi if you see us around.

We leave you with something inspirational to mull over – these are our school values which were underlined by you our community. These are the values that will be encouraged, modelled and explored at our school, and will be evident in our school's philosophy, structures, curriculum, classrooms and relationships. We aim to have these reflected in everyday actions and interactions within Te Kura o te Rotopateke/Macandrew Bay School.



SCHOOL POOL CLOSING FOR THE SEASON TODAY

We have had a great season of swimming with our school pool! The last day for swimming is **Friday 10th March at 3pm.**

Coal Boiler upgrade

Last year our school was selected to be part of the Replacement School coal boilers to reduce greenhouse gas emissions programme because we have a very old coal boiler that heats our school. The project is being delivered by Ministry of Education consultants with support from the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority.

Coal boilers are replaced with renewable wood or electric heating sources, such as heat pumps. The demolition work on the old coal boiler at school is being completed at the moment following very strict ministry guidelines. The replacement for our coal boiler is going to be a pellet boiler which will be housed in a container adjacent to the old boiler room. The photos below show some examples of what these look like. We are excited about having some green planting on the side of the container! We hope to have this all up and running for Term 2.

Walk and Wheel to School Week/Move it March

We are very keen to promote and encourage active travel with Walk n' Wheel Week and throughout March, with Move it March!

Walk n' Wheel Week is run by Sport Otago, with funding from

the Dunedin City Council, the Central Otago District Council, and the Otago Motor Club Trust. It is a FREE event open to all Otago Primary (Year 0 – 8) Schools.

The event has been designed to promote and encourage active transport to and from school to help reduce congestion at the school gate.

We want to encourage as many children as we can to walk or wheel (skate, scoot, cycle) to school with a parent/caregiver/older sibling or independently as considered appropriate next week with the hope that they may carry on with this.

- Don't worry of you can't walk from home you might like to walk up from the dairy or Ralph Ham Park
- Classes will be tracking their Walk and Wheel progress
- Talk to others that live in your street/area- you may like to walk/wheel together
- Many of our Senior students would be happy to help the younger children with walking/wheeling to school

We have issued Hi Vis vests to the children. We would love to see all the children and adults wearing these next week. The staff and I will be looking out for children making a big effort to keep themselves extra safe wearing their Hi Vis vests and we have some prizes in the office to give out. Hopefully we can build some good habits around Hi Vis vest wearing and keep this up after Walk and Wheel to school week.

COVID and illness

There seems to be a bit of COVID around in our community at the moment!

Just a reminder about keeping your tamariki home if they are unwell. We have plenty of RAT tests available in the office if your whānau would like these. We are happy to send these home with your child if you email the office. Please let us know if your child does test positive with Covid-19 so we can monitor the potential spread in classes and support you.

In summary: If you test positive for COVID- You must self-isolate for 7 days while you recover.

Day 0 is the day your symptoms started or when you tested positive, whichever came first.

Your Household Contacts do not need to isolate. They should test daily for 5 days. If they test positive, they need to begin 7 days of isolation as someone with COVID-19.

Voluntary School donations and Sports Fees

VOLUNTARY SCHOOL DONATIONS - Your support makes a big difference to our school budget!

Although this is voluntary it does make a big difference to our school operations and finances if people do opt to pay it and it means that the children get a better deal in the classroom and the school has some hope of breaking even financially each year.

We try very hard to keep costs to a minimum for families. Our

suggested School Donations this year are the same amount as last year - \$25.00 per term or \$100.00 per child for the whole year. You are more than welcome to pay these per term or for the whole year – whichever suits you. Some parents have set up regular small direct debit contributions and that is fine also. It is worth parents knowing that the receipt you receive for any donations made to school can be used for an income tax credit from Inland Revenue.

You need to state clearly your child's name and what the money is for in the reference information e.g school donation, activity donation, sports fees, stationary etc.

You can also pay with cash or eftpos at the school office.

VOLUNTARY ACTIVITY DONATION

The suggested Activity Donation again is \$10.00 per child per term, or you may wish to pay \$40.00 for the whole year in one go. This money is used to help cover the costs of buses and activities such as going to the Museum, Sports Events, Toitu, Art Gallery, and it also pays for visits to school by different musical and drama performing groups etc, though Art Auction funds also help with these activities too. Payment can be made with eftpos at the school office or by internet banking to the school account.

SPORTS FEES

We offer many sporting opportunities for children outside of school hours. Participation in these teams is reliant on payment of the fee by a set date. This is a fee, not a donation, as it is not part of the required school curriculum, so must be paid in order for your child to participate.
